The idea is to draft good but simple and short articles.


We aim to foster bridges between research and practice. For this reason, these short articles shall be **published in stakeholders' online news website and/or magazines**.

### What are we looking for?

Short pieces on any relevant topic, easily readable articles, not technical ones, in magazines read by stakeholders, and blogs mostly HE or specifically ISM focused, helping to disseminate ENIS activities and outputs.

### How does it work?

Any member from any WG can propose a new article anytime and begin looking for a co-author, joining the activity. You can find the list of article published, as well as co-author and articles ideas, in this shared excel sheet of the activity.

Authors are encouraged to self-organize and publish short articles. <u>However, please inform the to avoid duplications of themes/venues</u> as well as to keep <u>track of progress in this deliverable</u> of the ENIS action.

## Where may I publish?

As long as it is a recognized venue for ISM and HE discussion, with a practical oriented approach, it fulfils requirements for this activity. Examples includes also the EAIE blog, Forum magazine, the Times Higher Education, The Loop from ECPR. These are just examples, you can propose new magazines that might be suitable for the short article proposed.

#### What is not suitable?

Long articles, written with specific and technical jargon, following an academic format, publications in academic journals... ...and everything else that is already usually read by researchers.

# Requirements to join the activity

- Articles shall be the result of joint work within ENIS participants: Be a team (min two, max three)
- Be coherent with ISM and ENIS activity: don't go off topic!
- Insert your work in this excel as soon as you start working, so that we can keep track of published articles and update the count of this ENIS deliverable!

### Guidelines while working

- Identify just one clear core message for your article
- o Choose a stakeholder oriented publication venue
- Use a non-academic-style and plain language (no scholar jargon)
- Get it contact with the short article's activity coordination before publishing (it is a formality to keep track of the activity!)
- Stick to your plan. Notify coordinators if you change the core idea to avoid duplication
- Don't forget to mention ENIS COST ACTION in the last line of the article, before or after your short bio. Copy this sentence:
